Your story	I strongly oppose the RFS 10/50 Clearing Code. I quote: "This code allows property owners within 100m of parks and bushland to cut down trees based on self-assessment.
	Many magnificent old trees with large hollows used for habitat have been taken out because of what is permitted under this legislation."
	The number of properties adjoining bushland is huge, so the devastation that this will bring to the environment is massive, at the time when we have had very large environmental devastation due to land clearing, bushfires and climate change. These properties (like my own) attract owners and buyers through the beauty of the natural environment, and the elevated fire risk is a risk one is aware of and accept when you move here. It is the cost you pay for living in a more natural environment.

I think the most effective way of bringing the fire risk down is to take steps to address climate change, which will make the bush less flammable. By allowing greater devastation of the environment through measures like these, climate change can only be further accelerated, which will bring even bigger catastrophies.
