Your story

I became a volunteer for a local wildlife affected by the bushfires. I was disapointed at the lack of support and organisation by the NSW Government, NPWS, MPI in response to wildlife care and guardianship during and after the bushfire crisis. I volunteered at a local triage vet clinic in Cooma NSW which was set up by a New Zealand charity with a local wildlife organisation. NPWS, MPI and the NSW Government did not have any initial planning or funding for the care of affected wildlife in regards to search and rescue, emergency veterinary care or feeding, and this was left to volunteer organisations to fund and try to assist. NPWS did not allow animals within the national parks to be assisted by trained volunteers or allow feeding assistance. Without overseas disaster relief organisations trained in animal welfare, wildlife volunteers, search and rescue and volunteer veterinary care, local wildlife would have had little to no assistance at all from the government who are responsible for their guardianship.
