# 1.1 Causes and contributing factors

It is well-established that the risk, nature and impacts of these bushfires were worsened by climate change -1.1 degrees average global warming to date.

### 1.3 Response to bushfires

We support the Eurobodalla Shire Council's call for research on the likely impacts of climate change on bushfire frequency and intensity. Specifically, the bushfire scenarios under various peak warmings (1.5, 2, ... 4 degrees) should be researched.

Any government's first duty is to protect its citizens. This is the driver behind our NSW impressive Covid-19 response. We submit that this duty be properly extended to protection from bushfires in a warming climate.

Ensuing sensible bushfire protective measures involving construction standards, retrofitting, fuel reduction, asset protection zoning, major infrastructure protection and emergency management will all be less effective if the underlying climatic driver of dangerous bushfires is not addressed

Without truly effective climate action, we, who have so personally experienced what a worsening future holds, cannot feel safer for ourselves and our community or confident for our offspring's future.

### 1.4 Any other matters

We submit that NSW Government do its utmost to convince and support communities, companies and governments everywhere to rapidly exit coal, gas and oil dependence, reduce emissions and embrace renewables.

The long-term economic opportunities, even for coal miners, are greater in a renewables powered economy than a fossil fuel powered one. Moreover, energy generation and use can be unconstrained in a renewables world. Thus, allowing high-energy technologies and industries to flourish, as the economist Ross Garnaut has explained in his recent book, Superpower.
