Thank you for all the good firefighting gear, but get more. Look after our volunteers. It costs lots to be a volunteer. Don't talk about volunteers if your not one, because you don't have a clue what it's about. Keep planners in Incident Management Teams restricted to locals only. And pay and indemnify volunteers to do the job. Stop backburning unless it is absolutely necessary. Stop making fires bigger, make ever effort to put them out. Inaccessible fires bullshit put them out. Work out how to do it. Save lives and everything else. This event has caused many people to reassess their love of the rural urban interface or rural life. Please look at every aspect of the growth of these fires on the south coast of new south wales and work out if the actions taken to mitigate them was right. My property on Dunks Creek road was burnt through.
