

Major Hawkesbury River Flood Warning

Londonderry, Berkshire Park and Llandilo Residents in the blue areas on the map should PREPARE NOW.

Water will rise around South Creek and Rickabys Creek very quickly and without warning.

Nepean River at Menangle has recently hit Major flood level and Warragamba Dam is spilling. Water levels are rising very fast at Castlereagh and every tributary that needs to flow past Windsor is in flood.

All that water will need to go somewhere and that somewhere will be a backwards flow up South Creek and Rickabys Creek.

Exact timing of this is unknown and exact high water level is unknown. The Bureau of Meteorology has warned of a flood similar to last year but I suspect higher levels around the creeks because of the simultaneous local and river flooding.

It is possible that Bennett Rd will be under water as early as late tonight/early tomorrow morning.

My Background

I am a resident of Londonderry in the Local Government Area of Penrith, my residence is not directly affected by flood water, however my local community has been impacted by flood water on four occasions in the past 18 months. On each occasion I have been personally involved with assisting the community in varying capacity. I have long-standing involvement with the community including membership with the Londonderry RFS for 10 years and I hold board and committee positions with several local community organizations. In December 2021 I was elected Councillor for North Ward in Penrith City Council.

This submission is made in my name only and a connection to my position as Councillor of Penrith City Council or membership of NSW Rural Fire Service should not be considered.

Terms of Reference

- 1. The Inquiry is to consider and report to the Premier on the following matters:
 - a. the causes of, and factors contributing to, the frequency, intensity, timing and location of floods in NSW in the 2022 catastrophic flood event, including consideration of any role of weather, climate change, and human activity;
 - b. the preparation and planning by agencies, government, other entities and the community for floods in NSW, including the accuracy and timing of weather forecasts, current laws, emergency management plans, practices and mitigation strategies, their application and effect;
 - c. responses to floods, particularly measures to protect life, property and the environment, including:
 - i. immediate management, including the issuing and response to public warnings;
 - ii. resourcing, coordination and deployment, including with respect to the Australian Defence Force; and
 - iii. equipment and communication systems;
 - d. the transition from incident response to recovery, including the roles, structure and procedures of agencies, government, other entities and the community;
 - e. recovery from floods, including:
 - i. immediate housing, clean-up, financial support and community engagement measures; and
 - ii. longer-term community rebuilding support; and
 - iii. any other matters that the inquiry deems appropriate in relation to floods.

Submission

1. Preparation and Planning by Agencies

Relating to terms of reference 1. b. "the preparation and planning by agencies, government, other entities and the community for floods in NSW, including the accuracy and timing of weather forecasts, current laws, emergency management plans, practices and mitigation strategies, their application and effect;"

Current laws

It is my opinion, formed through personal experience, that the current laws are prohibitive of a pragmatic approach to managing and dealing with emergencies.

The State Emergency Service Act 1989 has the following key components:

20. Commissioner to control emergencies

Subject to the State Emergency and Rescue Management Act 1989, the Commissioner is to have overall control of operations in response to an emergency to which this part applies

21. Duty to recognise authority of Commissioner and emergency officers

 Every member of the NSW Police Force and all other members of emergency services organisations are to recognise, in connection with operations in response to an emergency to which this part applies, the authority of the Commissioner and emergency officers acting under the Commissioners orders or the orders of the zone commander or local commander.
 It is the duty of every such member to assist the commissioner or other emergency officer in connection with those operations

24. Offense to obstruct Commissioner or emergency officer

A person must not obstruct or hinder the Commissioner or other emergency officer, or any other person acting with the authority of the Commissioner, in the exercise of a function under this Act.

Maximum penalty: 50 penalty units or imprisonment for 2 years, or both.

As well intended as this legislation is it prevents, and has prevented on several occasions, local communities coming together in a pragmatic manner to help themselves in the absence of assistance provided by the Commissioner. The legislation also prevents other community organisations and local governments from providing assistance to local communities when there is an absence of direction by the Commissioner.

In March 2021 NSW SES were unresponsive to community requests and needs, as such the community rallied together to help themselves, in doing so members of Londonderry RFS were ordered to stand down until requested to assist by the Commissioner via Cumberland Zone Inspector and Penrith Council were ordered by NSW Police Nepean Local Area Command to not provide assistance until requested. Memories of this situation created caution within the Londonderry community in March 2022 when a repeat of inadequate emergency responses were noted.

In order to allow a pragmatic approach to local needs or to compensate for times when the Commissioner's resources are stretched or limited I propose an amendment to the Act whereby the following words are added in relation to Sections 20, 21 and 24:

"except where the Commissioner is unwilling or unable to provide reasonable emergency services".

Emergency Management Plans

I consider that Emergency Management Plans do not consider long held knowledge of Hawkesbury-Nepean flood behaviour, or there is a failure in the implementation of such plans. Additionally, there is a notable absence in the rectification of identified failures, or again, a failure in the implementation of amended plans.

In March 2021 I identified and communicated failures of emergency management plans to several relevant people and key political figures in Penrith; including direct 2-way communication with the Minister for Emergency Services, I was unsuccessful in my attempt to communicate with the Commissioner of Resilience NSW. It is my understanding that my communication document was widely shared with further relevant people. The emergency management plans implemented in March 2022 showed no change in the response with respect to Rickaby's and South Creeks.

In March 2021 the Hawkesbury River flooded to a level of 12 meters at Windsor, this flooding caused a backward flow of floodwater up Rickaby's creek into Londonderry as well as up South Creek into Llandilo and Shanes Park and up Eastern Creek toward Schofields.

This pattern of flooding is well documented with historical notations dating back to 1867, which include the documented rescue in 1912 of Charles Hacket and his family from their home near what is now known as Charles Hacket Drive, St Marys. Additionally, NSW State Emergency Services have produced a video explaining, with visual flood modelling, the flooding effect of the Hawkesbury-Nepean River with reference to the "Bathtub Effect". The outcome of this "Bathtub Effect" is shown in the modelling where it depicts the upward flow of floodwater and consequential flood water inundation along Rickaby's, South and Eastern Creeks.

A number of failures were identified in the event in March 2021; including three key areas of concern:

- SES unavailable and unresponsive and Community refused assistance
- Inadequate action relating to the flooding event along Rickaby's Creek
- Inadequate preparation and response to the requirements of Londonderry's needs, particularly the supply of, and access to, sandbags

These concerns were described in detail and communicated through the use of the document in appendix named Londonderry Flood March 2021.

On 2 March 2022 Nepean River conditions were similar to the lead up to the flooding event in March 2021. At this point emergency management plans did not extend past the supply of sandbags in one central location in Penrith, some 15km away from the impending inundation.

By the afternoon of 2 March 2022, it was very obvious to me that a flood similar to March 2021 would be repeated. Throughout the afternoon and evening I unsuccessfully advocated for the issuance of a warning or order for properties around Rickaby's and South Creeks. In the evening of 2 March 2022, in the absence of official warnings to Rickaby's Creek and South Creek, I felt duty bound through reasonable foreseeability of risk to human life to publish a warning to social media.

The social media post included a brief of the known data and a prediction that Rickaby's and South Creeks will rise quickly and inundate areas in Londonderry, Berkshire Park and Llandilo in the following day, possibly overnight. This warning was widely shared and reached 10,000 people within a few hours. A copy of this warning is in appendix. I then drove around high-risk locations to ensure the message had been received. I have no knowledge of any requirements to rescue any flood inundated people or animals in the localities of my warning area – in stark contrast to the flooding event of March 2021.

The following morning Hawkesbury River reached 11 meters at Windsor and water began inundating homes on Bennet Rd, Londonderry from about 5am. At about 8am an Evacuation Warning (not Order) was issued for the entirety of Londonderry, but not areas along South Creek. This Warning was later amended to read "low lying areas of Londonderry" but did not provide any further details. Londonderry has a population of approximately 4,000 people across an area of 36 km2, consequently, this warning created significant confusion in the local community.

By about 10am television news programs were broadcasting live footage of rescues from properties along South Creek in Shanes Park and Werrington. These locations were not specifically named in my warning nor was there any official warning. The Werrington rescue is particularly noteworthy, a Defence Force Helicopter was used to lift occupants to safety from house on Water St, roughly 500 meters away from where Charles Hacket required to be rescued in 1912. A warning was never issued for these areas that required rescues.

The experiences described above form the basis of a reasonable argument that Emergency Management Plans do not consider well documented historical learnings and systems are not in place to continually improve the Emergency Management Plans following feedback from the community, or the Emergency Management Plans are not implemented adequately.

2. Responses to Floods

Relating to terms of reference 1. c. "responses to floods, particularly measures to protect life, property and the environment, including: i. immediate management, including the issuing and response to public warnings; ii. resourcing, coordination and deployment, including with respect to the Australian Defence Force; and iii. equipment and communication systems;"

Immediate Management

With respect to Rickaby's and South Creeks and with reference to the examples provided above Flood Evacuation Warnings and Flood Evacuation Orders have been either non-existent or have arrived after the inundation of flood water, which has led to the requirement to rescue people and animals from flood inundated properties.

Following the identification and communication of emergency service failures in the flooding event of March 2021, as detailed above, the flooding event of 3 March 2022 demonstrated no signs of improvement or change in approach to the management of the flood.

Resourcing, Coordinating and Deployment

With respect to Rickaby's and South Creeks and with reference to the examples provided above, there have been no, or very limited resources coordinated or deployed to the areas around Rickaby's and South Creeks within the Penrith Local Government Area.

The emergency responses provided to Rickaby's and South Creeks in March 2022 would be considered unsatisfactory given the information collected and knowledge developed over 155 years and particularly unsatisfactory given the feedback I provided following the March 2021 flooding event.

Londonderry Flood – March 2021

There are three key areas of concern, these include:

- SES unavailable and unresponsive and Community refused assistance
- Inadequate action relating to the flooding event along Rickaby's Creek
- Inadequate preparation and response to the requirements of Londonderry's needs, particularly the supply of, and access to, sandbags

All information provided below is certifiable with documented evidence or is information that is available on the public record.

To better understand the situation that led to the events of Tuesday, 23 March 2021 (next section) the timeline of two separate yet connected events have been provided on following pages.

SES unavailable and unresponsive and Community refused assistance

At About 12pm 23/3/21 I met a lady that had been helping the community along with her partner and another local man. In the absence of SES, they were driving around flood affected areas checking on the welfare of Londonderry residents and delivering sandbags sourced from Windsor. The Lady was set up in the carpark of Londonderry Neighbourhood Centre where she was coordinating her efforts.

Upon meeting her she mentioned that she had been trying to obtain access to the community hall for use as a point of collection for donations and distribution of those donations for displaced people and animals within the local area. She had many lined-up donations and records of necessities including dog food, blankets, clothes, lunch box items for kids, stock feed, toiletries, feminine hygiene products etc

Her issue was that Penrith City Council would not permit her access because she was not a community organisation. I got myself involved and contacted a Penrith City Councillor and nominated Londonderry RFS as the responsible organisation as they occupy the building directly behind and had a crew present with the station open. At 12:49 I informed Officer in Charge of Londonderry RFS of my nominating them. I was informed by the Councillor that this would be adequate to have the hall opened and someone would be there soon with the keys.

The keys never arrived but instead at 2:50pm I received a call from the Officer in Charge telling me that they have been ordered by the Inspector of Cumberland Zone Fire Control to stand down, to return all appliances and personnel to the station, at the request of the Commissioner. Reasons given were that SES were the lead authority and RFS have not been requested or instructed to undertake this activity. This conversation also included questions about who I was, what I was doing and notifications that complaints had been sent to the Prime Minister's office – I presume because Melissa McIntosh MP was present helping with the sandbags.

I later learned that Penrith Council were instructed by Police to not open the hall.

The key issue that caused the requirement for community members to open the hall was that SES were nowhere to be seen and were not responsive to phone calls. We all understand that they are extremely busy, there is no questioning that, and we are all happy to jump in and help the community when the community needs help but to have this grass roots community support shut down by bureaucracy is demoralising, heart wrenching and infuriating all at the same time.

The lady referred to above has since set up her operations at Bligh Park with the support of Hawkesbury City Council and set up a Facebook group called Hawkesbury Donation Group.

Rickaby's Creek Flood Response Timeline

Rapidly rising water as a result of floodwater from the Hawkesbury River flowing backwards up Rickaby's creek. This is a well-known attribute of a Hawkesbury River flood and is included in many SES flood videos.


