Your story We own a property in South Lismore. The

property was purchased in 2021. During the 1974 flood the water came 12cm into the home, damaging the floor coverings and nothing more. Our tenant knew this, hence he felt safe enough for his elderly mother and he to live there safely. On the night of the flood, he got his car to higher ground and he (alone) stayed at the property. At

4am he was woken to water coming into the bed. You can imagine the terror he must have felt. When he realised the water was still rising he escaped to the roof where he was rescued only an hour before the property was submerged in water.

He was left with no recoverable possessions. We have now been left with a decimated property and 3 months on, no idea if we are covered by insurance or if we should rebuild given the likelihood that we may see another flood of this magnitude.

There has been no decision on what to do longterm with the town, no offer of land swap, no buy back and nothing proposed.

The justification that we shouldn't have purchased in a 'flood zone' is ridiculous when councils/govt have built on one in the first place. There seems to be no sense from anyone. The trauma combined with the drawn out process of trying to get help, answers and insurance coverage is appalling. I urge the govt to step in and help Lismore.
