Your story Two days prior to 28 Feb 2022 we were

watching weather and preparing along with my

community for flooding

We moved all belongings to higher level and

parked vehicle on higher ground

We were watching SES warnings and

predictions-water was not expected to exceed

the 2017 flood

We compared water levels with our floor level

and continued to monitor

deep water calling SES

The SES came down our street suggesting evacuation but as predictions were that if the 2017 flood we decided to stay with our animals and sit it out

As the evening progressed conflicting reports began filtering through

We went to bed at 1pm, setting our alarms for 3am

Around 3am I was woken by a loud noise under our house, I jumped up and ran to the window My son jumped up and we were horrified to see how high and how fast the water was coming in I saw the lights going off on my car across the road and broke down

Very quickly we knew we were in trouble
We began lifting our belongings up off the floor
and lower shelving and cupboards
Within hours we were standing on a bed in ankle

SES advised us to climb into our roof cavity
We put our cat into the ceiling cavity and waded
through water waste deep to our deck and
climbed onto our roof

We were trapped on our roof for 7hours
I called SES and the Police multiple times for
rescue and in particular for my elderly neighbour
who was trapped inside her house with water
reaching her shoulders

We were all eventually rescued by civilians in their boats. By the time they came for us water was up to our gutters and we literally stepped off our roof and into the boat

We were taken to our main bridge on the south side and dropped off and told to walk across and another boat would take us to higher ground I felt confused and disoriented as we traveled through water covering our neighbourhood and town

It was incomprehensible to see so much water rushing over our very high bridge
We were eventually transported by bus up the hill to and evacuation centre
I was in shock to see so many community

members assisting us and organising people to safety

I didn't see any SES or Police

It's been over 5 weeks, with a second flood which was not as high as the 2017 flood We've been displaced, lost everything and have

little idea of how to move forward

Our community has been absolutely amazing and I'm overwhelmed by the kindness and generosity in f others

We have been donated basic items and clothes to assist us in our recovery and take things a day at a time

Our home was damaged and it's taking weeks and months to get gas and electricity up and running

We're still in shock and very traumatised I no longer feel safe at home and question my ability to live here

SES gave incorrect information and did not have the resources to respond to such an event. After my initial call to SES at about 5am I was no longer able to get through Police took my calls and at the time I had no idea

Police took my calls and at the time I had no idea that they were doing just that, taking and logging calls only-they too had no way home f assisting
